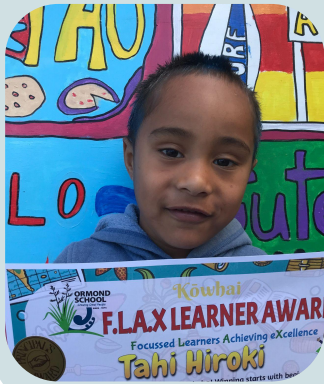

F.L.A.X Award Recipients

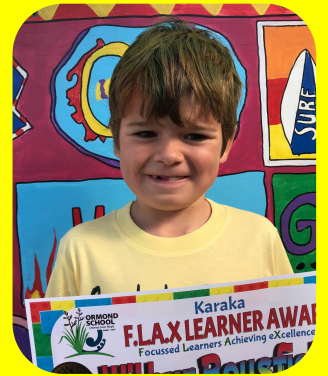
Tahi

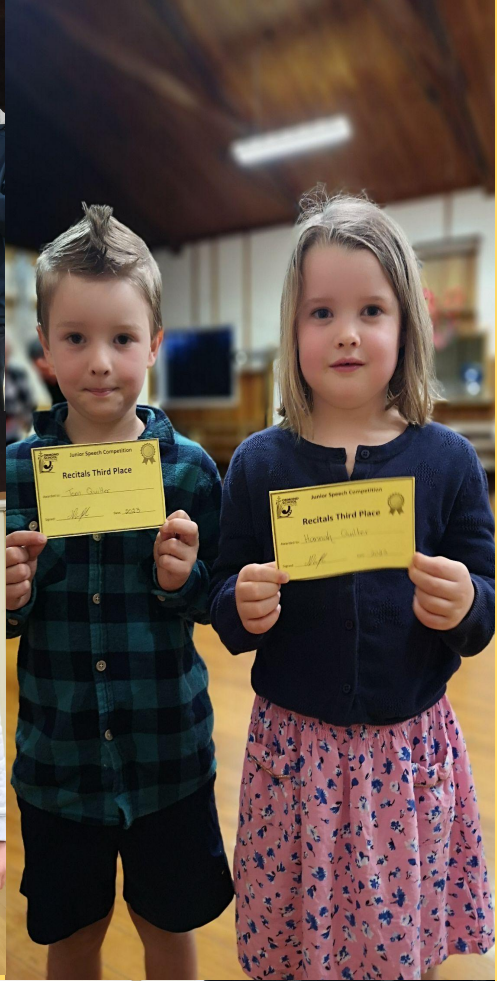

Courses

There will be three courses:
Year 1 - 3 Junior 973 metres
Year 4 - Y6 Intermediate 1,638 metres
Year 7 - 8 Senior 2,141 metres



Organisation on the Day

Buses can park at the Community House, cars can use the car park area in front of the school.

Instructions

Students will arrive, find their school name and sit with their school on the turf in front of our classrooms, preferably in their "walk the course" year groups. Each school, please provide a Team Marshall to look after your students to ensure they are ready for their event, stay in school grounds.

Walk the Course

All competitors will walk their course before they compete. Please advise all students to keep *behind* the adult guide (in a fluoro vest) while doing this. This will ensure runners follow the correct course. Note: No one needs to climb over electric fences or tape. If you do, you are going the wrong way or stopping people running their race and crossing the finish line.

Warm up Area

Students (Year Groups & Gender) will be called to the warm up area to stretch prior to their race.

Race Announcements and Marshaling

Each group will be called from the warm up area and asked to assemble at the gate. Students stay there until taken to the start line as they have to cross a road. A marshal will walk them over.

Finish Line

Ensure all runners cross the line and receive a place ticket. If they are in the top six runners, they will need to say their name and school to the recorders.

To help recorders, juniors may need this written on their hand. eg →
